

Based in Kensington, Sydney, NIDA's campus is located across the road from the education precinct of the University of New South Wales, with light rail and bus routes stopping right outside the front door.

NIDA's award-winning campus boasts state-of-the-art facilities. The indoor and outdoor performance spaces are constantly alive with productions, showcases and projects all year round.

HEALTH AND WELLBEING

NIDA understands the need to actively promote the holistic health and wellbeing of our students in order to thrive and achieve. Student training includes demonstrations, information sessions and workshops on a broad range of health topics from mindfulness to physical fitness and injury prevention.

ON-SITE COUNSELLING SERVICES

NIDA students have access to counselling services on our Sydney campus. Counselling can be helpful to assist students with mental health issues such as stress, depression and anxiety, as well as a confidential space to talk about life challenges such as grief, heartache and interpersonal difficulties. Counsellors are available four days per week, and students receive unlimited sessions during their study at NIDA.

TUITION FEES AND FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

SCHOLARSHIPS IN 2024

NIDA offers a range of scholarships to support students in attending NIDA, helping to cover living expenses and/or tuition fees.

Some scholarships can be awarded prior to arrival at NIDA, and may cover one year or multiple years of a degree. We also offer scholarships at the beginning of each academic year, supporting our students to continue their NIDA journey.

Last year, the NIDA Foundation Trust awarded more than \$900,000 in scholarship support to students. We are committed to building a diverse community of students and strongly encourage applications from students from diverse backgrounds. While most scholarships are available to students who can demonstrate financial need, we also have specific scholarships dedicated to supporting Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students, students from regional or remote areas, female-identifying students, and students who are Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CALD).

NIDA gratefully collaborates with generous industry partners, philanthropic organisations and individuals, trusts, and foundations and bequests to offer a wide range of scholarship opportunities.

OUR SCHOLARSHIPS INCLUDE

YouTube Scholarship

Launched in 2021 in partnership with YouTube, this scholarship is awarded to a successful applicant to any of NIDA's Bachelor of Fine Arts undergraduate courses who is from a background which has been historically underrepresented on screen and stage.

We define this as: First Nations and/or people of colour, people with a disability, applicants from remote and regional areas or are experiencing other barriers to access. The scholarship is \$45,000 over 3 years (\$14,500 per year).

The Balnaves Foundation First Nations Scholarship

This First Nations scholarship will provide \$30,000 per annum for three years (total \$90,000), for a First Nations student in a Bachelor of Fine Arts Course starting in 2023.

The student will also be matched with a First Nations Arts Industry mentor, provided with additional support with travel to home, an 'On Country' experience during the student's studies and a paid internship at the commencement of their course.

Animal Logic Entertainment Scholarships

There are two Animal Logic Entertainment
Scholarships available. One will provide \$30,000 for
an MFA Directing or MFA Writing for Performance
student who identifies as Indigenous or has
traditionally been underrepresented in the industry,
while the other will provide \$90,000 over the entire
degree for a BFA Design for Performance or BFA
Costume student who identifies as Indigenous or has
traditionally been underrepresented in the industry.

ARA Indigenous Scholarships

Three ARA Scholarships are available to Indigenous students already studying at NIDA in the BFA courses. This support contributes to enriching emerging Indigenous creative. \$10,000 a year for each scholarship.

NIDA has strong traditions, but our training is always evolving. We look forward to an ongoing conversation about how best to develop Australia's most promising young storytellers in a challenging, exciting, and evolving world.

By the end of your training, you will showcase your skills to industry representatives and enter the workplace as a flexible, adaptive, future facing artist capable of the highest level of artistic expression and ready for a confident life-long career.







The MFA Dramatic Writing is an industry-focused course designed to support and accelerate the careers of new writers telling compelling stories across stage and screen. Students undergo a rigorous exploration of the building blocks of dramatic craft as applied across theatre, film, television, and interactive and immersive writing. This is a practice-based course that structures learning around imaginative writing exercises and the development a portfolio of industry-focused projects, including two full-length works and multiple outlines ready to pitch. Students also develop professional friendships and undertake collaborative projects, such as working in TV writers' rooms, as well as working with directors and actors in the workshopping of scenes, and production of works across stage and screen.

This is an intensive course designed to prepare students for life as a professional writer, however, it also offers flexibility and a culturally safe, supportive and stimulating environment within which students can be curious, experiment with form and subject matter, and explore their own unique imagination and voice.

We believe that some of our most important stories are those least told and therefore strongly encourage applications from First Nations writers, and those from underrepresented communities. Building inclusive and collaborative environments and understanding issues of story ownership is viewed by NIDA as the core to developing an ethical practice.

The course is focused on developing versatile and adaptive dramatic writers capable of having sustainable writing careers. With the capacity to work across theatre, film and television, students receive a thorough overview of those industries, illustrated by industry guests, and learn how to generate opportunities to pitch themselves and their projects.
